

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

May Program - We watched the DVD: National Geographic – The 400 Million Dollar Emerald



Over a decade after its discovery, the high profile legal battle continues for ownership of the rare Bahia Emerald, an 840-pound gem that is considered to be the world's largest and heaviest emerald.

Recognized as one of the most renowned lawsuits in California history, the case has gained an international following. Per court documents, half-dozen or so claimants have already settled out of court with FM Holdings, Inc. (Ferrara Morrison Holdings). The remaining three respondents, FM Holdings, Inc., Mark Downie and Anthony Thomas, will face off again on case number BS118649 in January at the Stanley Mosk Courthouse in the Los Angeles Superior Court district.

After nearly six years of court dates and hearings, January's case is an extension of the April 2011 case where, per court documents, Los Angeles Superior Court Judge John A. Kronstadt found Anthony Thomas' claim of ownership of the Bahia Emerald not credible. After the ruling, Kronstadt was sworn in as a federal district judge and was replaced by Judge Michael Johnson. Wishing to hear the case himself and make an independent ruling, Judge Johnson has brought the case to light yet again.

Per court documents, FM Holdings, Inc., comprised of real life "Indiana Jones" Jerry J. Ferrara, Kit Morrison, a private equity financier, and accounting and financial expert Todd Armstrong, maintains it has the valid legal title to the Bahia Emerald and alleges that it also has an equitable claim to title as bona fide purchasers of the Bahia Emerald. Law firms Greene Broillet & Wheeler and Balaban & Spielberger represent FM Holdings. Inc. We stand behind our claim and are confident that we will prevail as the legal and rightful owner of the Bahia Emerald," said Jerry J. Ferrara, founder of Global Quest TV and prominent historical researcher.

In the National Geographic Special "The 400 Million Dollar Emerald," researchers and experts follow the Bahia Emerald from the mines of Brazil's Bahia Region in 2001. The emerald, which contains more than 180,000 carats of emerald crystals, is being held at the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department evidence locker until the case is resolved.


Ray Mine



Last summer I went to the Ray Mine. which is located near **Burnsville North** Carolina. In most places the top layer of material on the spoil pile has been dug into two to three feet. The best way to find mineral specimens is to dig deep into the spoil pile to find material that has

not been searched through. After a couple days of digging, I had a hole about seven feet deep and had stated to widen my hole. 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Herkimer Diamond Quarts Crystals



"Herkimer Diamonds" is the name given to the doubly terminated quartz crystals found in Herkimer County, New York and surrounding areas. Examples of these crystals are shown in the photo. Note that these crystals have the typical hexagonal habit of quartz, however, instead of having a termination on one end, they are doubly terminated. This is a result of the crystals growing with very little or no contact with their host rock. Such doubly terminated crystals are very rare and this is part of what makes Herkimer Diamonds so popular with mineral collectors.

The host rock for Herkimer Diamonds is the Cambrian-age, Little Falls Dolostone. The Little Falls Dolostone was deposited about 500 million years ago and the Herkimer Diamonds formed in cavities within the dolostone. These cavities are frequently lined with drusy quartz crystals and often are coated with a tarry hydrocarbon.

Although Herkimer County, New York is the location for which these crystals are named, similar doubly terminated quartz crystals have been found in a few other locations, including Arizona, Afghanistan, Norway, Ukraine and China. They have the same appearance but cannot rightfully be called "Herkimers".

Staurolite

It is the official state mineral of the U.S. State of Georgia.

Staurolite is a regional metamorphic mineral of intermediate to high grade. It occurs with almandine garnet, micas, kyanite; as well as albite, biotite, and sillimanite in gneiss and schist of regional metamorphic rocks. Staurolite is one of the index minerals that are used to estimate the temperature, depth, and pressure at which a rock undergoes metamorphism.

The name is derived from the Greek word for cross, Stauros, and rock, lithos. This refers to the twinning it is commonly found in. Staurolite is not uncommon worldwide. Large deposits of good crystals can be found in Monte Campione, Switzerland, Brittany, France, Scotland, and Taos, New Mexico. Also some large deposits are present in Maine, New Hampshire, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Virginia, New Mexico, and Montana. Staurolite twins, especially the 90 degree crosses are sold as "fairy stones" for amulets and charms.

Physical Properties: Staurolite is a semi translucent dark brown to reddish mineral. It has a hardness of 7 to 7.5. Crystals are frequently twinned joining at either 60 or, less commonly, 90 degrees. It has a dull or resinous luster and a grey or white streak. It has a specific gravity of 3.65-3.75 and a hardness of 7-7.5. It is usually found in crystal habit, but is sometimes massive.

Bench Tips by Brad Smith

EASIER PRONG SETTING

When setting stones in a prong mount, the tool is less likely to slip off the prong if you grind a groove into its face or rough up the face a bit with sandpaper. Some folks prefer a prong pusher for doing this, and others like a set of pliers.

Easiest way to cut a slot on the pusher is with a file, and the easiest way to create a slot on one jaw of your pliers is with a cutoff wheel and then do a rough polish with a knife-edge silicone wheel.

FANCY RIVET HEADS



For a nice looking rivet head, use brass escutcheon pins. You'll have perfectly rounded heads that are all the same size and shape. The pins are a little hard to find, so try the best hardware stores first. Be sure to get solid brass pins, not brass plated steel. If unsure, test them with a magnet.

The pins are readily available online. Lee Valley Tools has them in 14 - 18 gauge and lengths from 1/4 inch to 1 inch. Go to <u>http://www.LeeValley.com</u> and do an item search on "brass escutcheon pin"

For best results, select a drill that gives you a hole with a close fit to the rivet. Trim the

rivet to a leave a little less than one diameter sticking out the back side. Place the head on a scrap of hard plastic on the anvil so as to not flatten the head. I prefer a ball peen hammer (with a small 3/8 inch ball) for setting the rivet.

Shop Help/Tips

Friction backs for pierced earrings are easy to make. Take a 12mm strip of sterling solver about 22 gauges and 22mm long, or a comparable strip of 14K gold. Find the center and pound it with a scribe to create a shallow funnel-like depression. Drill a hole in the center of the depression. File a design above and below the hold for easy gripping. Polish both sides. Bend each end in a spiral towards the center hole.
